Dear San Carlos Policymakers,

I hope this letter finds you well. I am writing to express my deep **concern** regarding the recent proposal to increase the waste collection fee in our city by 4.5% annually. The vendors should also be required to share their plans and innovations with the city administration and the public. This transparency will ensure that we are all working together to find cost-effective solutions.

5. Incentivize Energy Efficiency: To encourage an energy-efficient lifestyle, the proposed fee increases should not be applied to smaller waste carts. Encouraging the use of smaller carts for residents who generate less waste can contribute to reduced costs and promotes a greener, more sustainable environment. I kindly request that the city council reconsider this proposal and explore alternative means of addressing budgetary concerns without placing an undue burden on the taxpayers. It is crucial that public policies reflect fairness, equity, and fiscal responsibility.






